


Our Purpose

The ECPAC partnership is dedicated to breaking down barriers and building upon community strengths to increase access to affordable, high-quality, early childhood and family services in the areas of health, early learning, mental health, family support/education, and overall basic needs.

The ECPAC partnership works to reach across the County with a dedicated focus on areas where children and families and/or their communities are most under-resourced and struggling. This includes strategies to prevent and/or mitigate against the impacts of child poverty (AdCo: 13.7%, CO: 12.7%), child abuse and neglect, children born to teen mothers, and low academic outcomes (AdCo: 39.3% of 4th graders meeting/exceeding expectations in English Language Arts, CO: 46.1%). The 3 maps further support these disparities.

Our Partnering System

ECPAC strives to increase access to affordable, high-quality, available, comprehensive child and family services and supports, towards a community where all children and families are valued, healthy, and thriving. ECPAC partners with various organizations, families, and other key stakeholders, to create a coordinated and efficient early

childhood and family system, with strong shared accountability for child and family outcomes. ECPAC completes assessments and works with partners, to increase investments to support young children and families, based upon child and family outcome data and areas lacking adequate community resources.

Additionally, ECPAC increases both public awareness and public will about the importance of the first 5 years of life - when 90% of the brain develops. ECPAC works with partners, families, cities, Adams County, and the State of Colorado to ensure strong policies are implemented that support children and families' success. Finally, ECPAC cultivates leadership in all of these efforts, with both community service providers and families receiving services.

Success Stories

Child Maltreatment Prevention Action Team formed to develop and implement plan with funding from CDHS.

Two Policy Reports were completed with community commitment secured for moving forward the following: 1) Increased access to affordable highquality early care and education; 2) Providing services where families spend their time; 3) Improved social norming and messages to shift policies and systems; and 4) Bolstering economically diverse neighborhoods.

Just over 43% of Early Care and Education programs became or remained engaged in quality improvement efforts – reaching a Level 2 or higher in the Colorado Shines system (an increase of 3%), with 21% of programs reaching Levels 3-5 (an increase of 3.5%). 12 individuals across the Denver/Boulder metro and 2 ECPAC staff graduated from Colorado Trust's extensive 'Community Leaders in Health Equity' training.

A family partner was hired as a Family Support Specialist to facilitate classes for parents and engage families in leadership opportunities.

Sixty-nine (69) parents attended one of the six different parent/family class series provided by ECPAC in partnership with various community organizations. Additionally, 12,271 parent education materials were distributed throughout the community (35% increase) through trained community

partners.

A new partnership with Early Learning Ventures will bring the Early Head Start program to Adams County in center based and family home provider care.

Professional development was provided towards high quality services through 38 separate training/ professional development opportunities, with 28 unique topics, provided to a total of 873 (duplicated) cross-domain service providers – an increase by 33%.



Looking Ahead

Over the next year, ECPAC will continue to work towards progress in all three goals of the current strategic plan. Areas that will have added attention because they are either newer and require more dedicated effort or because there is an upcoming change are the following:

- 1. Secure funding and partnerships to successfully implement Family Resource Center Hubs where shared services are provided based on community need through strong community partnerships.
- 2. Further explore ways of supporting teen parents and expanding partnerships that support this work.
- 3. Increase ECPAC's private and corporate donor base towards greater diversification of funding.
- 4. Try newly developed strategies for better engaging Family Childcare Home Providers to support increased engagement of Early Care and Education Programs in quality improvement.
- Continue to work with partners in implementing the recommendations from the two reports - the Accessibility and Affordability of High-Quality Early Care and Education Programs and the Early Childhood and Family Policy Report. See reports at <u>www.ecpac.org/systems/reports/</u>
- 6. Complete a robust strategic planning process to develop a new Strategic Plan to begin July 2020.


