

## Senate Bill 23-174: Expanding Access to Behavioral Health Services for Colorado Kids

Sponsored by Sen. Kolker and Sen. Gardner and Rep. Lukens and Rep. Winter



Colorado's youth are in crisis. The COVID-19 pandemic has accelerated the decline in young people's mental health and well-being, and has further exposed the extent and severity of long-standing health concerns. Too many continue to face barriers accessing the services they need to lead happy, healthy lives as children and into adulthood.

<u>Colorado must invest in early, prevention-focused solutions to protect and ensure a strong start and healthy future for all Colorado children.</u>

Suicide is a leading cause of death among Colorado youth ages 10-24.

## SB 174 would expand access to behavioral health services for kids and their families.

Colorado youth under 21 must have a formal diagnosis to qualify for behavioral health services.

SB 174 removes this prerequisite and opens access to a wide array of services, such as psychotherapy and services related to case management, prevention, education, and outreach, without requiring a diagnosis. This policy applies to thousands of kids across the state covered by Medicaid and the School Health Services Program.

By eliminating the diagnosis requirement and covering a variety of behavioral health services, more Colorado kids and their families can equitably access affordable, early, prevention-focused services before a crisis occurs.
